

FOCUS

Studies published after the 2014

Protection of Communities and
Exploited Persons Act (PCEPA),
which criminalized the
sale/trade of sexual services for
the first time in Canada.

Included peer-reviewed articles and community-based reports.

INCLUSION CRITERIA

Studies involving **Canadian** sex workers.



Published after 2014 (post-PCEPA implementation).

Studies with diverse demographics and research designs.

LIMITATIONS

Exclusion of **undocumented** community experiences.



Limited representation of **rural** and **remote** sex workers.

RESULTS

POLICE INTERACTIONS

Issues: Stigma, victim-blaming, and dismissal of abuse reports.



Trans and **non-binary** sex workers face unreasonable stops and harassment.

Im/migrant sex workers encounter racial profiling and heightened surveillance.

Result: Widespread mistrust of law enforcement, deterring sex workers from seeking help in emergencies.

HEALTHCARE ACCESS

Issues: Stigma, condescension, and judgment from providers; Lack of culturally competent care for im/migrant sex workers.



Nearly two-thirds report unmet healthcare needs.

Significant mental and physical health disparities.

What's Working: Peer support, non-judgemental clinics, and gender affirming care improve experiences.

SOCIAL EXCLUSION

Issues: Stigma within and outside the sex work community.



Economic vulnerability, mental health struggles, and **isolation**.

Barriers to collective action due to **stigma** and hierarchies.

What's Working: Peer support networks; safe spaces for sharing resources, advocacy, and mutual support.

RECOMMENDATIONS



Decriminalize sex work and repeal harmful legislation like PCEPA.

Reform anti-trafficking policies to reflect the voices of sex workers.



representative studies to capture diverse experiences and challenges.

Police and healthcare provider training on anti-stigma, anti-racism, and cultural competency.



Establish sex worker-led health services and peer support networks.

Provide funding and resources for community advocacy.
